Sometime during the early hours before dawn, on Thursday, January 23, 2014, Sister Mable Humdy Goudeau put her long white robe and golden shawl in the stillness of the night, stepped on the morning star and flew away to be at rest with her Heavenly Father. Oh what a glorious transformation from 3504 Evans Drive to the Pearly Gates of Heaven.

Mable Humdy Goudeau was born to Jack and Watsie Humdy August 3, 1922. She was the fourth of five children. She is preceded in death by her mother, father, sisters, Myrtle and Beatrice, as well as her two brothers, Calvin and Melvin Humdy.



Mable grew up and attended public school in Wellston, Oklahoma. She accepted Christ and was baptized at an early age.

Mable moved to Oklahoma City in 1944, and united with Fifth Street Baptist Church under the pastorship of the Reverend J.H. Winn. She was a loyal and dedicated member of Fifth Street serving as an usher and a member of the choir. She served as financial coordinator, business manager to aid the building program of the church known as project "J.H. Winn".

Mable united in matrimony with Clearance Eaves. To this union a daughter was added, Belinda Eaves. Mr. Eaves and Belinda precede Sister Mable in death. In 1982, she united with Brother Henry Goudeau who also precedes her in death. This union brought with it a loving son, Maurice Goudeau of Vancouver, Washington.

On May 23, 1971, Mable became a charter member of the Wildwood Baptist Church of which she remained until the time of her death. She walked diligently in every financial endeavor in the church sponsored to support the building projects. In the early years of the church there were two outstanding projects. The first one was "The Pioneer Women". The second was project "Ant Hill". At the time Wildwood's theme was Women of Wildwood at work for the Lord. Some of these fund raising activities took place at the Eaves Nursery on Lottie. There she had dinners and bake sales on Saturdays. As the membership of Wildwood grew, she turned to the church for help. She would say, "I want everybody who can give me \$100. If you can't give \$100, give what you can. Give this \$100 at every church program". By her enthusiastic nature she aided the church to become debt free October 24, 2010.



She leaves to cherish her memory, a loving son, Maurice Goudeau of Vancouver, Washington; six grandchildren: Steiven (Maria) Eaves, Chelsey Eaves and Shemear Pickens, Crystal, Olivia and Kori Goudeau; several great grandchildren, a host of nieces, nephews, cousins and friends. In addition, she leaves behind a devoted neighbor and care giver, Mrs. Vera Cotton; two longtime friends (over 65 years), Sister Carrie Nero Nance and Sister Roland L. Johnson. Mable had a loving companion in her beautiful white poodle, Benji who loved and will miss her.
