Obituary

Norsey "Pan" Jackson was born on October 1, 1922, delivered by her grandmother, Rachel Cornelius Glover, a midwife, in rural Seward, Oklahoma. Norsey was the fourth of nine children born to June and Annis Younger.

On Wednesday, November 20, 2019, Norsey Jackson transitioned to her heavenly home. She was 97 years old.

Her parents, six siblings (Herschel, Julia, Louvinia, Stanley, Clifford, and Margaret), step-daughter, Elmer (Emma) Rollins, adopted son, Dr. Kenneth Kilgore, and the love of her life, her husband and friend, Robert "Bob" Jackson, all preceded her in death.

When Norsey was born, her mother asked her grandmother, "What did her baby look like, and what size was her newborn? Her grandmother replied that Norsey was the size of the pan her mother cooked biscuits in each morning. That is how and who Norsey was branded with the nickname, "Pan"."

At age 7, Norsey accepted Christ as her personal Savior in 1929 and was baptized in the Cottonwood Creek by Reverend Carter, pastor of the Mount Zion Baptist Church in Seward, Oklahoma.

Norsey completed the eighth grade, the highest grade available, at the then segregated Seward Public Schools. In the 1940's, Norsey moved to Oklahoma City, where she worked as a domestic worker most of her life, retiring from Mrs. Hearns Daycare in 1987.

On the fourth Sunday in July 1942, Norsey and her friend, Irene Martin, were out looking for a church home, when the two decided to visit an eating establishment. Robert Jackson walked in, and Irene told Norsey that she wanted her to marry the Boley boy. Norsey often joked that she met him, got acquainted with him, and married him in three weeks.

The two were united in Holy Matrimony on the front porch of the Younger Family home in Edmond, Oklahoma on August 23, 1942. The couple enjoyed a 66 year union. To this marriage, no biological children were born, but Mama and Daddy, the names they affectionately called each other, were the proud parents of a host of adopted children, who were recognized and loved as part of the Jackson family.

Norsey joined the St. John Missionary Baptist Church on the fourth Sunday in July 1944, where she served faithfully as a Cub Scout den mother, as a beginners' department Sunday school teacher, as a member of Women's Mission Union, and as a soprano songstress in the choir, noted for her signature song, "You Can't Make Me Doubt Him".

Norsey Jackson held the position of a diamond member, having served the St. John Missionary Baptist Church for 75 years.

In her leisure, Norsey found joy playing and beating her opponents in dominos, and she also took pleasure in going fishing with her husband and nephew, Clarence Holland, Jr.

Norsey Jackson's loving memory will be cherished by sisters, Levicia Owens of Los Angeles, CA and Ruth Colleen Younger of Oklahoma City, OK; and her sister-in-law, Yvonne Boyd California. She will also be missed by her adopted children and grandchildren, as well as dozens of nieces, nephews, cousins, and a myriad of close friends. Clarence Holland, Jr. provided her transportation, support, and companionship.
