




# REFLECTIONS FROM THE PAST



William L. Wedgeworth, Jr. (also affectionately known as Willie or Wedge or Wedgie) was born on December 17, 1930 to William Sr. and Charlotte McAlpin Wedgeworth, in Oklahoma City. He was the youngest of their six children, although eight children were raised in their home.

#### Education:

Willie learned many fundamental lessons from his father and brother, living and working on farmland in West Oklahoma City and as an entrepreneur of a self-built grocery store and movie theatre in Spencer, Oklahoma. He attended Orchard Park Elementary (now known as the Jesus House), in West Town, where he played in the Douglass High School band, while in elementary school. Entering high school, he became a member of the high school marching band, under Zelia Breaux.

In September 1947, William began school at Dunjee High School at Choctaw, Oklahoma, where he graduated in 1949. Coach Curley Sloss assisted him in becoming an "All State" Football Player, and in gaining a football scholarship to Langston University, in Langston, Oklahoma in 1949. At Langston, he majored in Industrial Arts, joined Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, and married his high school sweetheart. He became an alumnus in 1953. After his military service, he did further study at the University of Oklahoma and received a master's degree from the University of Central Oklahoma.

#### Military:

Drafted into the military right after college, he started training at Ft. Belvoir, Virginia School of Engineers, for the army. His military service took him to Korea, Japan, and Cuam as a member of SCARWAF (Special Category of the Army with the Air Force) during the Korean Conflict. As a Construction Draftsman, he assisted with the layout of air bases used in the conflict and received an Honorable Discharge in June 1955.

#### Religious Affiliations:

As a youth, Willie joined the First Baptist Church of Green Pastures, professing his faith and trust in God—a faith that continued through his life after joining 5thStreet Baptist Church in Oklahoma City, in 1958. At 5thStreet, he served as a Deacon since 1985, and as Financial Secretary—over all Church monies—for twenty-four years.

#### Marriage:

December 28, 1953, he married his long-time sweetheart, Bettye Wells (Pollard). God had a special plan for their parenting—giving them three children—"born in the heart and not under it."

#### Work Experience:

After returning to civilian life, he gained employment at Tinker Air Force Base as a Statistical Draftsman, where he was honored for his suggestion of a special guide that was adopted for use in the Directorate of Supply and Services, in the Comptroller's Office, the Graphics Department of Maintenance Engineering, as well as his own office. He was later employed by the Oklahoma City School System, where he was a teacher of Mathematic, Industrial Drawing and Photography at Douglass High, Kennedy, and the prestigious Northwest Classen High, where he was the first African American to join the staff.

Leaving the Public-School System, he was summoned to become the Director of Vocational Education at Guthrie Job Corp Center, where he served for eighteen years. Desiring to work closer to home, he returned to the OKC school system, where he retired from John Marshall High School in 1994 as an instructor of his original subject—Math.

### Organizations:

Wedge began a thirty-year bowling stint at the downtown YMCA—the only place blacks could bowl. He served as president of the Northeast Bowling League for a period at Bryant Center.
